### Reflection

### 19<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus silences the murmurers, "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me calls him." What does it mean to "listen to the Father"? It means being attentive to the needs and desires of our own humanity. If Elijah had not been brought to the point of starvation, he would not pray as he does today. What the doubters in the gospel find so far-fetched – "I am the bread that came down from heaven" – is, in fact, exactly what they need in order to be drawn to the Father's love. That is why "Christ loved us" by handing himself over for us "as a sacrificial offering."

### **Property Evaluation and Planning Update**

As reported in a previous bulletin we are pursuing a lease/sale agreement with the Coptic Church and SS Cosmas and Damian. We thought it best to share with all of you some background of the Coptic Church.

Members of the Coptic Christian Church believe both God and man play roles in salvation, God through the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ and humans through works of merit, such as fasting, almsgiving, and receiving the sacraments.

Founded in the first century in Egypt, the Coptic Christian Church shares many beliefs and practices with the Roman Catholic Church and Eastern Orthodox Church. "Coptic" is derived from a Greek term meaning "Egyptian."

The Coptic Orthodox Church claims apostolic succession through John Mark, author of the Gospel of Mark. Copts believe Mark was one of the 72 sent by Christ to evangelize (Luke 10:1).

However, Copts split from the Catholic Church in 451 A.D. and have their own pope and bishops. The church is steeped in ritual and tradition and places a heavy emphasis on asceticism, or denying the self.

#### **Coptic Church Beliefs and Practices:**

Copts believe in seven sacraments: baptism, confirmation, confession (penance), Eucharist (communion), matrimony, ordination, and unction of the sick. Baptism is performed few weeks after birth by immersing the whole body of the newborn into especially consecrated water three times. Confirmation is performed immediately after Baptism. Regular confession with a personal priest, called the father of confession, is necessary to receive the Eucharist. It is customary for a whole family to pick the same priest as a father of confession, thus, making of that priest a family counselor. Of all seven sacraments, only Matrimony cannot be performed during a fasting season.

While the Coptic Church forbids worship of saints, it does teach that they intercede for the faithful. It teaches salvation through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Copts practice fasting; 210 days out of the year are considered fast days. The church also relies heavily on tradition, and its members venerate icons.

Copts and Roman Catholics share many beliefs. Both churches teach works of merit. Both celebrate the mass.

The Coptic Orthodox Church's clergy is headed by the Pope of Alexandria and includes Bishops who oversee the priests ordained in their dioceses. Both the Pope and the Bishops must be monks; they are all members of the Coptic Orthodox Holy Synod (Council), which meets regularly to oversee matters of faith and pastoral care of the Church. The Pope of the Coptic Church, although highly regarded by all Copts, does not enjoy any state of supremacy or infallibility. Today, there are over 60 Coptic Bishops governing dioceses inside Egypt as well as dioceses outside Egypt, such as in Jerusalem, Sudan, Western Africa, France, England, and the United States. The direct pastoral responsibility of Coptic congregations in any of these dioceses falls on Priests, who must be married and must attend the Catechetical School before being ordained.

Daily, in all Coptic Churches all over the world, Copts pray for the reunion of all Christian Churches. They pray for the world's peace and for the well-being of the human race.

As of August 2, 2015 no sale or lease agreement has been signed for SS Cosmas and Damian.

#### REFECTIONS FROM MY ROCKING CHAIR:

Dear friends.

When I was a seminarian Father Raymond Brown, SS, an outstanding Scripture scholar, gave our retreat one year. He was asked what the word "spirituality" meant? He said simply, "Taking God seriously". We are Christians living in the spirit of the risen Christ, hence, we embrace a Christian spirituality. What does living in the spirit of Christ look like? Consider if you will this short essay by Father Howard Gray, SJ. He captures the essence of what it means to live a Christian spirituality:

"Following the example of St. Ignatius, (Christian) life centers on the imitation of Jesus - focusing on those priorities which constitute Christ's mind, heart, values, priorities and loves. What are those values, priorities and loves? Ignatius would encourage us to consider what Jesus said and did. At the foundation of Jesus' life was prayer, a continuous search for how best to live as an authentic human being before a loving God. Jesus preached forgiveness of sins, healed the sick and possessed, and gave hope to the poor, to those socially and economically outcast. Jesus spoke of joy, peace. justice and love; he summoned men and women from all classes of society to continue to follow his way to God and his commitment to helping people become whole and holy. Being a companion with Jesus on his mission gave Ignatius of Loyola's life a sense of purpose and meaning. 'It is just such companionship that lies at the heart of (Christian) spirituality. The (Church) attempts to incorporate these same gospel values into all its works. (Christians) stress the need to take time to reflect and to pray, in order to find out how God wants us to serve in all our ministries.' This active commitment to seeking God's leadership is called discernment. It is at the heart of St. Ignatius' Spiritual Exercises.

The overriding characteristic we see in Jesus is loving obedience, an open-hearted desire to find and to pursue how God wants other men and women to be forgiven, to be free, and to utilize all their talents and opportunities in ways which build up this world as a place where faith, justice, peace and love can flourish. This kind of spirituality is incarnational. It views the world as a place where Christ walked, talked and embraced people. It views the world, therefore, as a place of grace, a place of being able to give life to others.

At the same time, Christian spirituality is realistic. The world Christ faced was also a world of cruelty, injustice and the abuse of power and authority. Consequently, (Christian) spirituality affirms our human potential but also is dedicated to the ongoing, day-in-day out struggle between good and evil. No one apostolic work exhausts how good can be done; therefore, (Christians) do all kinds of work. The (Christian) norm is: to find where God will best be served and where people will best be helped."

What a privilege it is to walk with Christ! The original title of the Jesuits, which they still use in some settings is, The Company of Jesus. Could there ever be a better companion? It I think!

## Fr. Tom Heron's Weekly Reflection

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Lord Jesus, Welcome!

I rejoice in your presence with the Saint Matthew faith worshiping community as we participate in the Liturgy for the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time. We are blessed by your desire to give thanks to Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, both parishioners and guests. May you be renewed in mind, heart and spirit through the Word and Eucharist we share. Thanks for joining us!

Exodus 16:2-4, 12-15 Psalm 78 Ephesians 4:17, 20-24 John 6:24-35

The reading from Exodus and from the Gospel of John teach us an important lesson. God had just delivered the Israelites from slavery with signs and wonders. He sent them on their way to the promised land and opened up the Red Sea. Yet, the first recorded act, once they got on the other side, was not gratitude. They never said, "Thank you, Lord, for all You did to set us free." No, instead they complained, grumbled, told God how dissatisfied they were that they didn't have enough to eat.



A similar pattern unfolds in the Gospel. Jesus has cured many people of sickness and disease: the blind, the lame, the deaf, the leper. He has just performed the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fish. He tries to get away for a period of rest so that He can restore His strength. The crowd follows Him. They will not let Him alone. Jesus knows their hearts. "You follow Me not because you believe but because you have eaten your fill of the loaves." You are interested in food and nothing else, not your salvation, not your neighbor's need, not your soul.

How do you explain this? Those who were privileged to see so many miracles end up thinking only of themselves? Ingratitude is a mystery. But let's look at our own lives. Parents work hard to make ends meet. How often do they hear a word of thanks? There is food, water, clothes, activities to do together. Do we take all this for granted? Do we just expect everything will be done for us, just the way we want and no other?

What about teachers? They prepare class, endure stress, take a vital interest in each student, invest time and self, try to be always there. How often do we

say thanks?

At the basis of ingratitude are selfishness and an empty life. Lives are empty because they are busy with futile things. These lives are like an old wash rag, wrung out and empty. If you have this feeling or know someone who does, then life is being wasted. The diseases (patterns) of grumbling, chronic complaining, belly-aching, whining are all too common and can easily become the petty poison of our spiritual life. If unchecked, they can exercise a corrosive effect on our perspective and on our relationships.

The Scriptures today ask us to take stock of ourselves. Pause and think of how much we have to be grateful for. Manna, what is it? It is the food on your table, the love you receive but never notice, the interest shown to you, the house in which you live, your parents, children, friends.



Receive the Lord in gratitude. In your thanksgiving after Communion say thanks in your heart and sometime today say thanks with your lips to all those who make your life so worthwhile.

Concentrate on what is essential in your life. Don't exaggerate your needs. Realize that you make life complex with inflated expectations, and complicate it by turning luxuries into necessities. Try making love the one rule for dealing with others. Trust that God loves you and cares for you with infinite compassion, even in the smallest details. If you can live with the essentials and not be intimidated by things that don't really matter in life, Jesus' claim that you will never hunger or thirst again is not simplistic at all.
