REFLECTIONS FROM MY ROCKING CHAIR

A Bride Married to Amazement
"... When it's over, I want to say all my life
I was a bride married to amazement,
I was the bridegroom, taking the world into my arms.

When it's over, I don't want to wonder If I have made of my life something particular, and real.

I don't want to find myself sighing and frightened, Or full of argument.

I don't want to end up simply having visited this world."

I stand with Mary Oliver in being amazed at the mystery of the incarnation. It sets apart Christianity from the other major religions of the world. There is sometimes confusion between the respect we owe people of all faiths – preserving in this country the free exercise of religion. Respecting all religious traditions does not mean that all religions are the same, or have the same worth. Christianity proclaims an intimate relationship between God and humanity that is, the person of Jesus Christ, Son of God and Son of Man. It is the finer revelation of God. No other faith weaves in a single fabric the human with the divine. The kingdom of God is already present and demands a just society as a prelude to the kingdom of heaven.

While other sincere religious traditions shed some light on life's purpose, truth in its fullness abides in Christianity, especially in Catholicism. This is not arrogance, or some excuse for bigotry, nor is it an argument for proclaiming the United States as a "Christian nation". We are a nation founded by men and women who were mostly Christian and we have struggled not to exclude others who journey to our shores — as our ancestors did — with backgrounds different than our own.

Buddhism has some notion of meditation and the moral life with little sense of a personal God. Hinduism, and its principle of reincarnation, supports a social structure that validates the rich and pacifies the poor (the untouchables), who should be content with their state in life as a prelude to the next life, hopefully, and advancement to a more perfect state. Islam, founded by the prophet Mohammed in the 7th century AD, stopped short of embracing that union of God and man in the person of Jesus. This is a difficult time for Muslims who are wrongly identified with the terrorists that have distorted their faith. We must be careful not to be bigoted. (Were all Irish Catholics members of the violent IRA? Were they violent because they were Catholics?)

As we seek to secure our country – as best we can – from the threat posed by terrorists, let us not succumb to that temptation to be inward looking at the expense of our participation in the human family, all created by God, that knows no borders. As Mary Oliver suggests, don't just settle for having passed through this life. Take a stand and make a difference so that others might be "married to amazement".



When next I write I'll offer some direction that comes to us as Roman Catholics from Pope Francis and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). Go to those places yourself on the Internet. Why wait for me? Blessings, Monsignor Owens

Fr. Tom Heron's Weekly Reflection

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Lord Jesus, Welcome!

I rejoice in your presence with the Saint Matthew faith worshiping community as we participate in the Liturgy for the 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time. We are blessed by your desire to give thanks to Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, both parishioners and guests. May you be renewed in mind, heart and spirit through the Word and Eucharist we share. Thanks for joining us!

Charles Dickens' A Tale of Two Cities begins: "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times." Perhaps these words describe the economic boom of the 1990s that the United States enjoyed. As you know, many Americans suddenly got rich on the stock market and the number of millionaires in the country soared. For them it was indeed the best of times.

Social studies showed that the bottom 20 percent of the population did not share in that prosperity and the gap between the very rich and the very poor widened. For the poor, mere observers of and not participants in the economic boom, it was the worst of times because they felt excluded.


One of the major themes of the Bible – both in the Old Testament and the New Testament – is the suffering of the poor. The choice of the Sunday scripture readings deliberately reflects this theme. Biblical passages about the poor were not written to make us unhappy but to make us uncomfortable. A Christian cannot be totally happy with an abundance of goods knowing about those who are deprived of the basic necessities of life – food, clothing, shelter.

Since concern for the poor is a major biblical theme, Jesus, as expected, makes it His own dominant message. Nothing arouses the anger of Jesus as much as injustices that increase the suffering of the poor. Jesus' choice of metaphors to describe His disciples leaves no doubt that He wants His followers to have an impact on society.

In today's Gospel Jesus tells us that we are the salt of the earth. Yet salt gets a bad rap in our health-conscious society because of its association with heart problems. But in the time of Jesus, when refrigeration was unheard of, salt was an important factor as a preservative. Laborers were often paid with a number of portions of salt, from which practice we get the term "salary." Likewise, while electricity has made it possible for us to turn day into night, light sources were of a meager kind in Jesus' time. A shining light caught people's attention and made them sit up and take notice. We are to be the light of the world.

The message that Jesus wants to bring to the world's attention is the message of Isaiah in today's first reading: "Share your bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and the homeless. ... Then light shall rise for you in the darkness, and the gloom shall become for you like midday."

Jesus said it succinctly, "we are the salt and the light of the world." Salt spices the dull and melts the frozen. Salt causes us to be thirsty. Hopefully, thirsty for truth, peace, justice, holiness. Light illuminates the darkness. May we be like Saint Paul, resolved to share the crucified Christ, always anticipating a share in His resurrection.



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
