Fr. Tom Heron's Weekly Reflection

Amos 8:4-7 Psalm 113 1 Timothy 2:1-8 Luke 16:1-13

"You cannot serve both God and mammon." (Luke 16:13)

Desiring wealth, acquiring wealth and safeguarding wealth are concepts we readily understand. But we seldom speak of "serving" wealth; to most of us, the very idea is abhorrent. When we "serve" something, we allow it to be the object of our attention, energy and even of our affection. That which we serve can be said to "own" us; the object of our attention — including money — can become the subject of our lives. Our choices, values, attitudes, actions, our very ways of defining ourselves are all directly related to this subject.

Whether we like to admit it or not, many of us are driven by the money-making compulsion. When money becomes our focus, there is no room for God in our lives; when money "possesses" us, we are no longer able to serve God and neighbor. Instead, we become slaves to our bank accounts, measuring our worth in terms of deposits and withdrawals rather than in terms of love, joy, peace and fulfillment.

Amos and Luke today are addressing the issue of wealth. Amos is blunt and aggressive. Luke is indirect and thought-provoking. Both hit us between the eyes. They startle us. What are the sins of the wealthy? Fixing scales for cheating. Selling rotten grain and foodstuffs. Convicting the poor for debts as meager as the cost of sandals. Buying and selling people for money. Trampling on the heads of the needy. God declares, **"Never will I forget such things."**

In the Gospel parable today, we expect Jesus to condemn the enterprising evil steward. Instead he is praised. What's going on here? Jesus is not extolling the man's ethical behavior. Why then did He make him the hero of the parable? It was the man's ingenuity and drive that Jesus was extolling. The man didn't sit around whining over his situation. He got busy and found a solution. He took initiative. Jesus was a Man of action and He wanted His followers to be people of action.

You can almost see the sad expression on Jesus' face as He concludes the parable with, **"The children of this world are wiser than the children of light."** Jesus uses the scoundrel in the parable to shock us into a new awareness. There is a moral numbness in our land today. We play fast and easy with the truth with our moral values and the commandments of God.

Reflections from my Rocking Chair

Dear friends,

On September 4, Pope Francis canonized Mother Teresa of Calcutta. To a congregation numbering 100,000 the Pope remarked "I think, perhaps, we may have some difficulty in calling her Saint Teresa; her holiness is so near to us, so tender and so fruitful that we continue to spontaneously call her 'Mother Teresa!'" He continued, "Mother Teresa, in all aspects of her life, was a generous dispenser of divine mercy, making herself available for everyone through her welcome and her defense of human life, those unborn and those abandoned and discarded. She was committed to defending life, ceaselessly proclaiming that the unborn are 'the weakest, the smallest, the most vulnerable'. She bowed down before those who were spent, left to die on the side of the road, seeing in them their God-given dignity; she made her voice heard before the powers of this world, so that they might recognize their guilt for the crime of poverty they created. Mercy was the 'salt' which gave flavor to her work, it was the 'light' which shown in the darkness of the many who no longer had tears to shed for their poverty and suffering. Her mission to the urban and existential peripheries remains for us today eloquent witness to God's closeness to the poorest of the poor." "Today," he told them, "I pass on this emblematic figure of womanhood and of consecrated life to the whole world of volunteers: may she be your model of holiness! May this tireless worker of mercy help us to increasingly understand that our only criteria for action is gratuitous love, free from every ideology and all obligations, offered freely to everyone without distinction of language, culture, race or religion." The Holy Father recalled that in reference to these different peoples Mother Teresa loved to say, "Perhaps I don't speak their language, but I can smile." Pope Francis told the congregation, "Let us carry her smile in our hearts and give it to those whom we meet along our journey, especially those who suffer. By doing so we will open up opportunities of joy and hope for our many brothers and sisters who are discouraged and who stand in need of understanding and tenderness. God is pleased by every act of mercy, because in the brother or sister that we assist, we recognize the face of God which no one can see. Each time we bend down to the needs of our brothers and sisters, we give Jesus something to eat and drink; we clothe, we help and we visit the Son of God. There is no alternative to charity. Those who put themselves at the service of others even when they don't know it, are those who love God."

That the congregation came from all quarters of the world was fitting testimony to Saint Teresa of Calcutta's expression of universal love. She and her sisters care for Hindus, Sikhs, Jews, Muslims and Buddhists, as well as Christians. 15 countries sent official delegations to the ceremony. Among them were the Foreign Minister of India, the presidents of Albania, Macedonia, Kosovo and Italy and the Queen of Spain. The US delegation included the US ambassador to the Holy See, Suzy George deputy assistant to the president, Sister Donna Markham, president and CEO of Catholic Charities and Carolyn Woo, president and CEO of Catholic Relief Services.

Pope Francis gave powerful expression to her, and his commitment to the poor by inviting 1500 poor and discarded people – cared for by Saint Teresa's Missionaries of Charity across Italy. They enjoyed a privileged place at the ceremony and afterward gathered for a pizza lunch in the atrium of the Paul VI audience hall.

In a world of sectarian violence, a true light graced us. Blessings, Monsignor Owens



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
